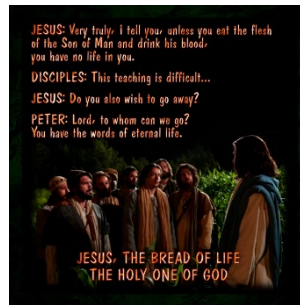

### Sunday Reflection: August 22<sup>nd</sup>

For the last four weeks, we have been following the story of Jesus' revelation of himself as the one sent by God and how his followers may draw life from him by eating his flesh and drinking his blood. In what is perhaps one of the saddest lines in the gospels, we read, "Many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him." When

Jesus then turns to his closest companions, the Twelve, he offered them the choice. They may go or they may stay. Peter voices their response on behalf of them all. Like the Israelites when Joshua offered them the choice, the disciples choose Jesus. And it is a truly wonderful profession of faith, "Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of everlasting life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God." This choice is not based on clear and full understanding. But rather on faith and love for Jesus.

### Feast of St. Bartholomew August 24<sup>th</sup>

Saint Bartholomew was one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ who was martyred in the 1<sup>st</sup> century A.D. (Feast Day August 24<sup>th</sup>). Saint Bartholomew lived in the first century AD and was one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ. He was introduced to Jesus Christ through Saint Philip and is also known as "Nathaniel of Cana in Galilee," notably in John's Gospel. Saint Bartholomew is credited with many miracles related to the weight of objects. He was martyred in Armenia, being either decapitated or skinned alive. Because St. Bartholomew's skin was flayed from his body, thereby exposing his nervous system, he is the patron saint against nervous and neurological diseases and ailments.
